



Overall Client Activity for First Quarter 06/07




Recidivism for Those Booked in First Quarter of 06/07




### Male Recidivism Rate in First Quarter of 06/07



### Female Recidivism Rate in First Quarter of 06/07




ALOS: Average Length of Stay; down 1.52 days from 4th quarter 05/06

### Female Release Report for First Quarter 06/07




Without outliers ALOS is 11.31

### Male Release Report for First Quarter 06/07




Without outliers ALOS is 10.68

### Number of Youth Booked by Gender for the First Quarter in 06/07




**Ethnic Distribution for First Quarter 06/07**




There was about a 40% difference between minority and non-minority bookings for the first quarter of 06/07. Up about 5% since last quarter in 05/06.


**Residence Zipcode Distribution for First Quarter 06/07**




**Crime Distribution for First Quarter 06/07**




2. 2 and 3-way Frequency Distributions for Zip code




Last Fiscal we were able to show that 32% of the population in the detention center consisted of those youth charged with either a conduct or drug charge. These youth were significantly represented by minority youth. In line with our DMC efforts, we are able to show that these individuals appear to live in the following zip codes, 87105, 87108, and 87121. It is recommended that we try and find community services available to these youth in these communities.




You will find below that Drug court, JPPO, and PEG are the top three holding agencies for the last quarter. There are 4 top zip codes for these types of holds, 87102, 87104, 87108, and 87123. It is recommended to further explore why these zip codes and not others are highly representative for administrative holds.



Unlike female administrative holds, male administrative holds usually come from 87105 and 87121. You will also notice that drug and alcohol charges are highly correlated with holds within the same zip code. For our DMC effort to be successful we should pay particular attention to gender for this variable seems to play a role in where these girls live versus where they commit the crime, as it does with males. In the last meeting we reported that APD brings youth in from northern areas when they actually live in southern areas of Albuquerque. Girls, however, do not live in the same area, as do the males when being charged for the same crime.




**Recidivism Rate by Zip Code First Quarter of 06/07**



The 87105 zip code represents 21% of all recidivates for the first quarter. 87121 represents 18%, and 87123 16%. Minorities are driving the overall 13%. Males are just at 75% while females are lower representing 25% of all recidivates.

Recommendation: For DMC impact I would start with these 3 zip codes.


**Recidivism Rate by Ethnicity First Quarter of 06/07**




Above it is shown that the highest population of Hispanics with a past booking is in 87105 and 87121. The majority of Caucasians can be found in 87105 and 87121. Remember these are populations who HAVE been booked into the detention center NOT the community population disaggregated. This is the recommendation: Is there an overrepresentation of one group from each zip code “at risk?” If this group is overrepresented are the crimes or charges those crimes or charges that can be treated in the community? Can these individuals be diverted before entering the detention center (APS)? If not, what diversion can be set in place to QUICKLY divert these youth? When one takes a step back and reviews the entirety of the data that has been presented in the past year you will find that we have lower social economic areas being charged with crimes in higher economic areas and then returning home. In addition, we have the youth from the lower economic areas driving our recidivism rates and utilizing an enormous amount of outside resource. Outside resource in this context means outside of their community. It is recommended

that we look closer as to why poorer male and female minorities are charged more often, put on higher levels of monitoring, held for RTC, violated more often, and held (court) more often than non-minorities. In order to investigate what appears to be an inequality we have put ourselves in a position to measure differences at each step of JJS (Distribute Time Line). These results will be reported at the next meeting. Please ask your staff to be accommodating to our statistical staff.
