

2014 LEGISLATIVE SESSION OUTCOMES REPORT: BERNALILLO COUNTY

Overview:

The 2014 New Mexico Legislature adjourned on February 20th after a 30 day session. The short session was restricted per the state constitution to legislation involving financial issues, appropriations and revenues, and measures messaged by the Governor and vetoed bills from the previous session. A total of 1,081 bills were introduced 91 passed both chambers and 10 were vetoed by the Governor.

Key legislation enacted included the General Appropriations Act, an omnibus capital outlay bill authorizing \$231.1 in capital expenditures for state and local governments, public schools and universities. There were relatively few bills that were enacted that have substantive impact on local government. The few that do include: HB 16 Liquor Excise Tax Distributions to the Local DWI Fund; HB 51 Right to Farm Act Nuisance Changes; HB 273 Economic Development Grant Program; HB 287 Firefighter Supplemental Benefits; SB 9 One Stop Business Portal Act; SB 31 Local Government Planning Fund; SB 98 Emergency Medical Service Provider Checks; SB 140 Tax Increment Development District Base Year Changes.

Several joint resolutions calling for constitutional amendments were introduced covering issues from minimum wage to the legalization of cannabis. Only 4 of the 40 joint resolutions were passed.

Bernalillo County Issues:

Over \$1.3 billion in capital outlay requests were submitted by legislators and the Governor. Severance bond capacity was estimated at \$184.8 million for 2014. Bernalillo County received authorization and appropriation in whole or in part for over \$24.6 million in capital outlay projects. The list of capital projects and the amounts appropriated are included in Attachment 1. Most of the county's top capital outlay priorities were approved. Bernalillo County legislators were very supportive of the county's requests and cooperated with others in the delegation to contribute funds for priority projects. The competition for capital funds is significant with schools and other public entities as well as not for profit organizations vying for project funds. This session the Governor also took a significant portion of available capital outlay funding for water projects statewide which reduced the available funding for other projects. In Bernalillo County for example there were approximately \$3 million in water related projects funded including \$2 million for Carnuel along with several failing domestic water systems in rural parts areas of the county.

In terms of substantive legislation, the most significant accomplishment was the passage of **Senate Joint Resolution 22 (and duplicate HJR14)**. These joint resolutions were sponsored by Senator Jerry Ortiz y Pino and Representative Mimi Stewart respectively. The resolutions authorize a constitutional amendment to be placed on the general election ballot this fall that if

passed will allow for Bernalillo County to develop a home rule charter that will then be placed on a ballot for county residents to vote on. County home rule will allow the county residents to decide on the form of governance they feel is best for them and to create a system of checks and balances to promote accountability, efficiency and effectiveness in county government. The adoption of a county home rule charter can be a sentinel event in the history of Bernalillo County.

Many of the items/issues contained in the county's legislative resolution were deemed by the House Rules and Senate Committee's Committee as not germane to the short session. Some proposals in the legislative resolution that were related to bills that were ruled not germane were not pursued. Other proposed requests did not receive funding due to budgetary constraints on state general funds.

Three items, the proposal for a forensic aftercare unit, funding for mental health and substance abuse counseling in public schools and changes to property tax administration were not funded but are being pursued by groups, including county officials, that have been or are being formed to develop plans to address these issues during the interim. The appropriate legislative interim committees will also include these topics in their work plans and agendas. A group formed by Senate Pro Tem Mary Kay Papen has already held two meetings to address behavioral health issues in public schools.

There were no significant changes enacted to the State's tax code that would have negatively impacted Bernalillo County. While there were several bills considered that would have removed taxing authority of local governments none were passed. There will, however, be a concerted effort to develop proposals to remove the 3/8ths percent of authorized local option gross receipts tax increments for consideration next session as part of a change to the food and medical hold harmless legislation.

Interim Activities:

There will need to be significant county involvement in actions related to the vote on the county home rule amendment pursuant to SJR 22. It is suggested that the county establish a task force consisting of business, civic and other interested parties to promote the proposal and begin developing a framework for a home rule charter.

As noted, there will be several issues of county interest that will be included in legislative interim committee work plans and agendas plus special working groups already established on school behavioral health, criminal justice reform and tax policy.

Joint Memorials of interest include: HJM 13 Kirtland AFB Fuel Spill Clean-Up; HJM 15 Study Pre-Booking Diversion Program; SJN 5 Medicaid Services Oversight Council; and, SJM 28 University Economic Development Association Summit.

There will also be several state agency rulemaking proposals occurring during the interim that may have impacts on county government including economic development, environment, human services and Medicaid, criminal justice and licensing and regulations. Shoats and Weaks will closely follow any such rulemaking activities.

Shoats and Weaks appreciate the opportunity to represent Bernalillo County government at the state legislature and with state elected officials and state agencies. We thank the Bernalillo County legislative delegation for their support and county staff and commissioners for providing expertise and assistance during the legislative session.

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SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 22

51ST LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - SECOND SESSION, 2014

A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 10, SECTION 10 OF THE
CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW CERTAIN COUNTIES TO BECOME
URBAN COUNTIES AND TO CLARIFY THE MAJORITY VOTE NEEDED TO ADOPT
A COUNTY CHARTER.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10, Section 10
of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. A county that is less than one thousand five
hundred square miles in area and has [~~at the time of this~~
~~amendment~~] a population of three hundred thousand or more may
become an urban county by the following procedure:

(1) the board of county commissioners shall
[~~by January 1, 2001~~] appoint a charter commission consisting of
not less than three persons to draft a proposed urban county

SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Joint Resolution 22 amends Article 10, Section 10 of the New Mexico Constitution which addresses the creation of urban counties.

The bill proposes three primary changes:

- 1) removes references to the date of the section's last amendment and allows for an up-to-date calculation of county population, as opposed to population at the time of the last amendment, in order to determine whether a county may be considered under the provisions of the section;
- 2) changes the number of votes needed to adopt a proposed county charter from a majority of all eligible, qualified voters to a majority of those voting, thus making it less difficult to obtain a voting majority in favor of a proposed charter; and
- 3) clarifying the language describing the powers granted to urban counties by removing several superfluous word and adding a pair of clarifying terms to the section.

The substantive changes are limited to the population calculation, allowing counties with growing populations to become eligible for urban county charters, and reducing the required majority vote, easing the electoral threshold required to adopt a charter.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Under Section 1-16-13 NMSA 1978 and the NM constitution, the SOS is required to print samples of the text of each constitutional amendment, in both Spanish and English, in an amount equal to ten percent of the registered voters in the state. The SOS is also required to publish them once a week for four weeks preceding the election in newspapers in every county in the state. In 2012, the cost for the 2012 General Election ballots was \$46 thousand per constitutional amendment. However, if the ballot size is greater than one page, front and back, it would increase the cost of conducting the general election. In addition to the cost of the ballot, there will be added time for processing voters to vote and would mean additional ballot printing systems would be required to avoid having lines at voting convenience centers.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

If enacted, this constitutional amendment will be submitted to voters for their approval or rejection as the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

SJR 22 effectively would:

- (1) Remove the requirement that the urban county had to have a population of at least 300,000 at the time of the passage of the constitutional amendment. This would allow counties who meet the 300,000 population threshold in the future to pursue becoming an urban county.
- (2) Remove the requirement that a charter commission needed to be appointed by January 1, 2001; the effect of this amendment would be to allow Bernalillo County to pursue becoming an urban county again and at any time (although if a charter is rejected by the voters, one year must elapse after the election before another charter commission can be appointed).

SJR 22 is narrowly drawn. As a practical matter, only one political subdivision would meet the requirements of this bill for the foreseeable future: Bernalillo County.

Amended Section 10 would apply only to counties that are less than one thousand five hundred square miles in area and have a population of three hundred thousand or more. Only four New Mexico counties are less than 1,500 square miles in area. They are: Bernalillo County (670,968), Los Alamos County (18,159), Curry County (49,938) and Valencia County (76,361). Statistics noted in parentheses are 2012 estimated population, provided by US Census Bureau on its website <http://quickfacts.census.gov/qfd/states/35/35061.html> .

Los Alamos County in 1964 became a home rule, incorporated county under a constitutional amendment (N.M. Const., Art. 10, Sec. 5), so has no need to organize as an urban county under Article 10, Section 10.

Curry County and Valencia County are not likely reach the three hundred thousand population threshold required to be an urban county in the near future.

OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

DFA analysis states that the powers of an urban county are the same as those of a home rule municipality. It also notes that this resolution continues the trend of differentiating between municipalities and counties with respect to eligibility for home rule powers. Municipalities of any size, population, or population density may, with voter approval, practice home rule (N.M. Const., Art. 10, Sec. 6C).

Duplicates HJR 12 Urban Counties and County Charters, CA

AMENDMENTS

AGO analysis suggests that here is an inconsistency in the bill with regard to voting requirements with the use of the term “majority” in Subsection A(3) (lines 9-10, page 2) and then again in Subsection B (lines 4-5, page 3).

Subsection B addresses, among other functions, the process for approving and assessing taxes in urban counties. The current law requires that any tax imposed by a governing body of an urban county be “approved by a majority vote.” This language should be changed to clarify the whether the majority need be of the number of qualified voters in the urban county or, mirroring the proposed amendment in Subsection A(3), “a majority of those voting.”
