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1 **Chapter 2 – ADMINISTRATION**  
2 **ARTICLE V. - PURCHASING**

3 **DIVISION 1. – GENERALLY**

4 **Sec 2-356. RULES OF CONSTRUCTION; PURPOSES**

- 5 (a) The Procurement Ordinance (“Ordinance”) shall be liberally construed and applied to  
6 promote its purposes and policies.
- 7 (b) Any conflict in interpretation of the Ordinance with the New Mexico State Procurement  
8 Code [NMSA 1978, Section 13-1-1, et seq.] shall be resolved as required by applicable  
9 law.
- 10 (c) The purpose of the Ordinance is to provide for the fair and equitable treatment of all  
11 Persons involved in public procurement, to maximize the purchasing value of public  
12 funds and to provide safeguards for maintaining a procurement system of quality and  
13 integrity.

14 **Sec 2-357. APPLICATION OF THE ORDINANCE**

- 15 (a) This Ordinance applies to all expenditures by the County of Bernalillo (“County”) for  
16 procurement of Tangible Personal Property, Services, and Construction, except as  
17 otherwise provided in this Article.
- 18 (b) Procurement involving the expenditure of federal funds must be conducted in accordance  
19 with the mandatory applicable federal laws and regulations. Such laws and regulations  
20 will supersede this Ordinance where it is inconsistent with those federal laws and  
21 regulations. Nothing in this Ordinance shall prevent the County from complying with the  
22 terms and conditions of any grant, gift or bequest that is otherwise consistent with the  
23 County Code of Conduct or other applicable law.
- 24 (c) When mandatory applicable state or federal laws or regulations are inconsistent with the  
25 provisions of this Ordinance, compliance with such state or federal laws or regulations  
26 shall constitute compliance with the Ordinance.
- 27 (d) Any Contract or procurement document executed in violation of the Ordinance or other  
28 applicable laws shall be void and of no effect.
- 29 (e) All matters not specifically addressed in the Ordinance are intentionally omitted and are  
30 not governed by the provisions of the State of New Mexico Procurement Code, unless  
31 expressly made applicable to home rule local government entities.
- 32 (f) The effective date of section 2-393 (Design and Build Project System Requirements)  
33 shall be April 26, 2018. The balance of this Article shall become effective on July 1,  
34 2018.
- 35 (g) **NO IMPAIRMENT FROM PARTIAL INVALIDITY:** The provisions of this Ordinance  
36 are severable, and if any provision, section, clause, sentence, or part thereof is held to be  
37 illegal, invalid, unconstitutional, or inapplicable, to any person, persons, circumstances,  
38 situation, or otherwise, the illegality, invalidity, unconstitutionality or inapplicability  
39 shall not affect or impair any of the remaining sentences, clauses, sections, articles, or  
40 parts of this Ordinance or their applicability to other persons, circumstances or situations.

**1 Sec 2-358. DEFINITIONS**

- 2 (a) Architectural and Engineering Services - Professional Services within the scope of the  
3 practice of architecture and professional engineering, as defined by the State of New  
4 Mexico, involving research, design, development, Construction, alteration, or repair of  
5 real property;
- 6 (b) Best Obtainable Price – a price at which Tangible Personal Property, Services or  
7 Construction can be purchased which is most advantageous to the County;
- 8 (c) Bidder or Offeror - one who submits a bid or proposal in response to a Request for Bids,  
9 Request for Proposals, or submits a Quote in response to a call for formal or informal  
10 Quotes;
- 11 (d) Brand-Name Specification - a Specification limited to describing an item by  
12 manufacturer's name or catalogue number;
- 13 (e) Brand-Name or Equal Specification - a Specification describing one or more items by  
14 manufacturer's name or catalogue number to indicate the standard of quality, performance  
15 or other pertinent characteristics and providing for the substitution of equivalent items;
- 16 (f) Capital Project - a project involving Construction, paid for with funds intended for capital  
17 improvements, which may include Architectural or Engineering Services;
- 18 (g) Central Purchasing Office – the central department or office of the County led by the  
19 Chief Procurement Officer and charged with the duty of procurement;
- 20 (h) Chief Procurement Officer – the Person holding the position as the head of the  
21 Procurement Office in the County;
- 22 (i) Construction - building, altering, repairing, installing or demolishing in the ordinary  
23 course of business any: (1) road, highway, bridge, parking area or related project; (2)  
24 building, stadium or other structure; (3) airport, subway or similar facility; (4) park, trail,  
25 athletic field, golf course or similar facility; (5) dam, reservoir, canal, ditch or similar  
26 facility; (6) sewage or water treatment facility, power generating plant, pump station,  
27 natural gas compressing station or similar facility; (7) sewage, water, gas or other  
28 pipeline; (8) transmission line; (9) radio, television or other tower; (10) water, oil or other  
29 storage tank; (11) shaft, tunnel or other mining appurtenance; (12) electrical wiring,  
30 plumbing or plumbing fixture, gas piping, gas appliances or water conditioners; (13) air  
31 conditioning conduit, heating or other similar mechanical work; or (14) similar work,  
32 structures or installations. Construction shall also include: (15) leveling or clearing land;  
33 (16) excavating earth; (17) drilling wells of any type, including seismographic shot holes  
34 or core drilling; and (18) similar work, structures or installations;
- 35 (j) Construction Management - consulting services related to the process of management  
36 applied to a public works project for any duration from conception to completion of the  
37 project for the purpose of controlling time, cost and quality of the project;
- 38 (k) Construction Manager - a Person who acts as an agent of the County for Construction  
39 Management, for whom the County shall assume all the risks and responsibilities;
- 40 (l) Construction Manager at Risk - a Person who, pursuant to a Contract with the County,  
41 provides the pre-Construction Services and Construction Management required in a

- 1 Construction Manager at Risk delivery method;
- 2 (m) Contract - any written agreement for the procurement of items of Tangible Personal  
3 Property, Services or Construction;
- 4 (n) Contractor – means any business having a Contract with the County to furnish Tangible  
5 Personal Property, Services or Construction;
- 6 (o) Cooperative Procurement – (i) the action taken when two or more entities combine their  
7 requirements to obtain advantages of volume purchases, including administrative savings  
8 and other benefits; (ii) a variety of arrangements, whereby two or more public  
9 procurement entities (or agencies) purchase from the same supplier or multiple suppliers  
10 using a single RFB or RFP; (iii) cooperative procurement efforts may result in Contracts  
11 that other entities may utilize;
- 12 (p) Cost-Plus-Percentage-of-Cost-Contracts - an agreement in which the Contractor is  
13 provided a specified percentage profit over and above the actual costs of Tangible  
14 Personal Property, Services or Construction;
- 15 (q) Debarment – a final order that denies a Contractor the right to bid or offer to enter into a  
16 Contract with the County;
- 17 (r) Definite Quantity Contract - a Contract which requires the Contractor to furnish a  
18 specified quantity of Tangible Personal Property, Services, or Construction at or within a  
19 specified time;
- 20 (s) Determination - the documentation of a decision including the facts and justifications  
21 required to support a decision. A Determination becomes part of the procurement file to  
22 which it pertains;
- 23 (t) Employee - an individual receiving a salary, wages or per diem and mileage from the  
24 County whether elected or not and any noncompensated individual performing personal  
25 services as an elected or appointed official or otherwise for the County;
- 26 (u) External Procurement Unit - any procurement organization not located in the State of  
27 New Mexico which, if in this state, would qualify as a state agency or a Local Public  
28 Body. An agency of the United States government is an External Procurement Unit;
- 29 (v) Financial Interest – (i) holding a position in a business as officer, director, trustee, partner  
30 or holding any position in management; or (ii) ownership of more than five percent  
31 interest in a business;
- 32 (w) Gratuity - a payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, service or anything  
33 of more than nominal value, received or promised, unless consideration of substantially  
34 equal or greater value is exchanged;
- 35 (x) Immediate Family - a spouse, father, mother, child, father-in-law, mother-in-law,  
36 daughter-in-law or son-in-law;
- 37 (y) Indefinite Quantity Contract - a Contract which requires the Contractor to furnish an  
38 indeterminate quantity of specified Tangible Personal Property, Services, or Construction  
39 during a prescribed period of time at a definite unit price or at a specified discount from  
40 list or catalogue prices;

- 1 (z) Landscape Architectural Services - services including but not limited to consultation,  
2 investigation, reconnaissance, research, design, preparation of drawings and  
3 Specifications and administration of Contracts where the dominant purposes of such  
4 services are: (i) the preservation or enhancement of land uses and natural features; (ii) the  
5 location and Construction of functional approaches for structures, pathways or walkways;  
6 or (iii) the design of trails, plantings and landscape irrigation. Excluded from the  
7 provisions of this section are the services of architects, engineers and surveyors as  
8 defined in this Article;
- 9 (aa) Local Public Body - every political subdivision of the state and the agencies,  
10 instrumentalities and institutions thereof;
- 11 (bb) Multiple Source Award - an award of Contract for one or more similar Tangible Personal  
12 Property, Services, or Construction to more than one Bidder or Offeror;
- 13 (cc) Multi-Step Sealed Bidding or Proposal – a two phase process consisting of a technical  
14 first phase when Bidders submit unpriced technical offers and a second phase when  
15 approved Bidders have costs reviewed;
- 16 (dd) NMSA – New Mexico Statutes Annotated;
- 17 (ee) Person - an individual, corporation, business trust, estate, trust, partnership, limited  
18 liability company, association, joint venture or other legal or commercial entity;
- 19 (ff) Price Agreement – a Definite Quantity Contract or Indefinite Quantity Contract which  
20 requires the Contractor to furnish items of Tangible Personal Property, Services, or  
21 Construction to the County which issues a Purchase Order or written agreement, if the  
22 quantities ordered are within the quantity limitations of the Contract, if any;
- 23 (gg) Professional Services – services rendered by members of a recognized profession or  
24 possessing a special skill. Such Services are generally acquired to obtain information,  
25 advice, training or direct assistance. Services of architects, archeologists, engineers,  
26 surveyors, landscape architects, medical arts practitioners, scientists, management and  
27 systems analysts, certified public accountants, registered public accountants, lawyers,  
28 psychologists, planners, researchers, Construction Managers and other Persons or  
29 businesses providing similar Professional Services, which may be designated as such by a  
30 Determination issued by the Central Purchasing Office;
- 31 (hh) Public Records – all documents, papers, letters, books, maps, tapes, photographs,  
32 recordings and other materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, that are  
33 used, created, received, maintained or held by or on behalf of the County and relate to  
34 public business, whether or not the records are required by law to be created or  
35 maintained;
- 36 (ii) Purchase Order - the document issued by the Central Purchasing Office that directs a  
37 Contractor to deliver items of Tangible Personal Property, Services, or Construction;
- 38 (jj) Quote – purchasing method generally used for small orders under a certain dollar  
39 threshold, request is sent to suppliers along with a description of the commodity or  
40 Services needed and the supplier is asked to respond with price and other information by  
41 a predetermined date. Evaluation and recommendation for award should be based on the  
42 quotation that best meets price, quality, delivery, service, past performance, and

- 1 reliability. Award is made to the most Responsive, Responsible Bidder;
- 2 (kk) Request for Bids (“RFB”) – all documents used to solicit competitive single or Multi-  
3 Step Sealed Bids for which an award is based on compliance the Specifications and low  
4 bid pricing;
- 5 (ll) Request for Proposal (“RFP”) – all documents used to solicit proposals from potential  
6 providers (Offerors) for Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction. Price is  
7 usually not a primary evaluation factor. Provides for the negotiation of all terms,  
8 including price, prior to Contract award. May include a provision for the negotiation of  
9 best and final offers. May be a single-step or multi-step process. Award is made to the  
10 most Responsive, Responsible Bidder;
- 11 (mm) Request for Qualifications (“RFQ”) – a request for submission of unpriced offers to be  
12 followed by a formal solicitation limited to those Bidders or Offerors whose offers have  
13 been qualified under the criteria set forth in the first solicitation;
- 14 (nn) Responsibility – the status in which a Bidder or Offeror establishes, to the satisfaction of  
15 the Chief Procurement Officer, an ability to fulfill the solicitation expectations and  
16 requirements. The Chief Procurement Officer may consider such criteria as described in  
17 this Article;
- 18 (oo) Responsible Bidder (or Offeror) – a business entity or individual who has the ability to  
19 fulfill the solicitation expectations and requirements, including but not limited to  
20 financial and technical capacity to perform the requirement of the solicitation and  
21 subsequent Contract;
- 22 (pp) Responsive Bidder (or Offeror) – a Contractor, business entity or individual who has  
23 submitted a bid or proposal that fully conforms in all material respects to the Request for  
24 Bids /Request for Proposal and all of its requirements including all form and substance;
- 25 (qq) Selection Advisory Committee (“SAC”) – the committee established by County  
26 Ordinance for the purpose of selecting firms to provide Services of architects, landscape  
27 architects, engineers or surveyors;
- 28 (rr) Services – furnishing labor, time or effort by a Contractor not involving the delivery of a  
29 specific end product other than reports and other materials which are merely incidental to  
30 the required performance. Services includes the furnishing of insurance but does not  
31 include Construction or the services of Employees of the County;
- 32 (ss) Specification - a description of the physical or functional characteristics or of the nature  
33 of items of Tangible Personal Property, Services, or Construction. "Specification" may  
34 include a description of any requirement for inspecting or testing, or for preparing items  
35 of Tangible Personal Property, Services, or Construction for delivery;
- 36 (tt) Surveying Services - any service or work, the substantial performance of which involves  
37 the application of the principles of mathematics and the related physical and applied  
38 sciences for: (i) the measuring and locating of lines, angles, elevations, natural and man-  
39 made features in the air, on the surface of the earth, within underground workings and on  
40 the beds or bodies of water for the purpose of defining location, areas and volume; (ii) the  
41 monumenting of property boundaries and the platting and layout of lands and  
42 subdivisions thereof; (iii) the application of photogrammetric methods used to derive

1 topographic and other data; (iv) the establishment of horizontal and vertical controls for  
2 surveys for design, topographic surveys including photogrammetric methods,  
3 Construction surveys for engineering and architectural public works; and (v) the  
4 preparation and perpetuation of maps, records, plats, field notes and property  
5 descriptions;

6 (uu) Suspension – a temporary order of the Chief Procurement Officer that denies a  
7 Contractor the right to bid or offer to enter into a Contract with the County;

8 (vv) Tangible Personal Property - goods other than real property having a physical existence,  
9 including but not limited to supplies, equipment, materials and printed materials;

10 (ww) User Department or User – a County department, office, unit or staff member for which  
11 procurement services are provided.

12 **Sec 2-359. ELECTRONIC TRANSMISSIONS**

13 (a) The Chief Procurement Officer shall develop procedural rules to use electronic media,  
14 including distribution of solicitations and acceptance of sealed bids and competitive  
15 sealed proposals that include electronic signatures, which shall include:

16 (1) appropriate security to prevent unauthorized access to electronically submitted bids or  
17 proposals prior to the date and time set for opening of bids or the deadline set for  
18 receipt for proposals, including the electronic bidding, approval and award process;  
19 and

20 (2) accurate retrieval or conversion of electronic forms of information into a medium that  
21 allows inspection and copying.

22 (b) The Central Purchasing Office, in any Request for Bids or a Request for Proposals, may  
23 require all or any part of a sealed bid or a competitive sealed proposal to be submitted  
24 electronically if it determines that an electronic submission will be advantageous to the  
25 procurement process. If electronic submission is required:

26 (1) hard copy documentation shall not be submitted to the Central Purchasing Office  
27 prior to the award of the Contract, except as specifically identified in the Request for  
28 Bids or the Request for Proposals;

29 (2) the Request for Bids or Request for Proposals shall specify an opening date and time,  
30 a fixed closing date and time and an email account or other secure electronic location  
31 to which the electronic bid or proposal shall be submitted;

32 (3) sealed bids shall be opened publicly in the presence of one or more witnesses at the  
33 time and place designated in the RFB unless all bids are submitted electronically, in  
34 which case the amount of each bid, each bid item, and other relevant information as  
35 may be specified by the bid requirements, together with the name of each Bidder,  
36 shall be recorded and made open to public inspection by the Central Purchasing  
37 Office; and

38 (4) sealed proposals shall be opened by the Central Purchasing Office, then evaluated and  
39 the Contract awarded as required in the Request for Proposals and as otherwise  
40 provided in the Ordinance.

1 **Sec 2-360. CENTRAL PURCHASING OFFICE**

- 2 (a) The Central Purchasing Office shall perform all duties required by the Ordinance and  
3 other relevant statutes. The Central Purchasing Office may coordinate with the state  
4 purchasing agent, the Central Purchasing Offices of other Local Public Bodies, and the  
5 purchasing office of External Procurement Units to maximize benefits of joint and  
6 cooperative efforts.
- 7 (b) The Central Purchasing Office is delegated the responsibility for all procurement  
8 transactions, including negotiating and finalizing Contract documents as described  
9 herein, administering this Ordinance and ensuring compliance with all applicable  
10 policies, procedures, laws, regulations, rules, statutes and Ordinances. The Central  
11 Purchasing Office is also responsible for creating and maintaining the procedural rules  
12 needed to effectuate the Ordinance.
- 13 (c) All procurements shall be performed by the Central Purchasing Office except as  
14 otherwise provided in the Ordinance or other procedural rules promulgated under its  
15 authority.
- 16 (d) The County shall report to the State of New Mexico Procurement Agent the Person  
17 within the Central Purchasing Office designated as the "Chief Procurement Officer." The  
18 Chief Procurement Officer shall maintain high standards of education and knowledge of  
19 the profession.
- 20 (e) The Chief Procurement Officer may make Determinations regarding exemptions, the  
21 issuance of Purchase Orders, authorization of small purchases and approval of  
22 procurements pursuant to the Ordinance.
- 23 (f) The Chief Procurement Officer may delegate his/her authority to subordinates as he/she  
24 deems necessary and appropriate by clearly delineating in writing such delegated  
25 authority and the limitations thereto.

26 **Sec 2-361. EXEMPTIONS FROM THE PROCUREMENT ORDINANCE**

- 27 (a) The provisions of the Ordinance shall not apply to:
- 28 (1) procurement of items of Tangible Personal Property or Services from a state agency,  
29 a Local Public Body or External Procurement Unit;
- 30 (2) printing and duplicating Contracts involving materials that are required to be filed in  
31 connection with proceedings before administrative agencies or state or federal courts;
- 32 (3) purchases of publicly provided or publicly regulated gas, electricity, water, sewer and  
33 refuse collection services;
- 34 (4) purchases of books, periodicals, manuals and training materials published in all  
35 formats;
- 36 (5) insurance coverage for the County including but not limited to the New Mexico  
37 Association of Counties (excluding the purchase of insurance through a broker);
- 38 (6) travel by common carrier or by private conveyance and related travel expenditures  
39 such as meals and lodging;
- 40 (7) procurement of Tangible Personal Property or Services, as defined in this Article,

- 1 from the Corrections Industries Division of the New Mexico Corrections Department;
- 2 (8) purchases consisting of memberships, subscription services (excluding electronic or  
3 web-based subscription services), conference and training registration fees, and other  
4 similar purchases where prepayments are required;
- 5 (9) the issuance, sale and delivery of public securities pursuant to the applicable  
6 authorizing statute, with the exception of bond attorneys and general financial  
7 consultants;
- 8 (10) Contracts with a private independent Contractor for housing of inmates as well as  
9 the operation, or provision and operation, of a jail pursuant to Sections 33-3-26 and  
10 33-3-27 NMSA 1978;
- 11 (11) Contracts and expenditures for services or items of Tangible Personal Property to  
12 be paid or compensated by money or other property transferred to the Bernalillo  
13 County Sheriff's Department by the United States Department of Justice Drug  
14 Enforcement Administration;
- 15 (12) Contracts with professional entertainers;
- 16 (13) Contracts and expenditures for legal subscription and research services and  
17 litigation expenses in connection with proceedings before administrative agencies or  
18 state or federal courts, including experts, mediators, arbitrators, court reporters,  
19 process servers and witness fees, but does not include Contracts for legal services;
- 20 (14) Services of lecturers, speakers, trainers, facilitators and scriptwriters, when the  
21 provider possesses specialized training methods, techniques, or expertise in the  
22 subject matter;
- 23 (15) Contracts for services relating to the design, engineering, financing, construction  
24 and acquisition of public improvements undertaken in improvement districts pursuant  
25 to Subsection L of Section 3-33-14.1 NMSA 1978 and in County improvement  
26 districts pursuant to Subsection L of Section 4-55A-12.1 NMSA 1978;
- 27 (16) works of art for museums or for display in public buildings or places;
- 28 (17) Contracts with a Person, firm, organization, corporation or association or a state  
29 educational institution named in Article 12, Section 11 of the Constitution of New  
30 Mexico for the operation and maintenance of a hospital pursuant to Chapter 3, Article  
31 44 NMSA 1978, lease or operation of a County hospital pursuant to the Hospital  
32 Funding Act [Chapter 4, Article 48B NMSA 1978] or operation and maintenance of a  
33 hospital pursuant to the Special Hospital District Act [Chapter 4, Article 48A NMSA  
34 1978];
- 35 (18) direct purchases of advertising in all media, including radio, television, print and  
36 electronic, excluding Professional Services provided by marketing firms;
- 37 (19) procurement of services from community rehabilitation programs or qualified  
38 individuals pursuant to the State Use Act [13-1C-1 through 13-1C-7 NMSA 1978];
- 39 (20) purchases of products or Services for eligible Persons with disabilities pursuant to  
40 the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973;

- 1 (21) Contracts entered into by the Crime Victims Reparation Commission to distribute  
2 federal grants to assist victims of crime, including grants from the federal Victims of  
3 Crime Act of 1984 and the federal Violence Against Women Act of 1994;
- 4 (22) purchases of parts and labor or maintenance agreements to repair disabled  
5 equipment or machinery if the equipment or machinery is repaired by a franchised  
6 dealer or by a factory authorized repair shop or the original equipment manufacturer;
- 7 (23) purchases of computer software, online diagnostic tools, web-based or electronic  
8 subscriptions and ancillary services required to match software already in use. This  
9 includes licensing fees, upgrades, implementation, maintenance or other related  
10 Services for proprietary software, if such services are available from only a single  
11 vendor;
- 12 (24) sponsorship Contracts allowing Persons or other entities to publicize the County's  
13 participation in community events in return for consideration;
- 14 (25) purchases of drugs, controlled substances and other related chemicals, the  
15 distribution and use of which is controlled by law or requires licensing, provided that  
16 such purchases are properly receipted and accounted for with appropriate supporting  
17 documentation, which shall be subject to internal audit;
- 18 (26) purchases of Tangible Personal Property, and ancillary Services such as  
19 installation, training, modification or maintenance, where required to match  
20 equipment currently in use and where standardization is in the best interest of the  
21 County and where a unique or novel application (available from only a single  
22 provider) is required to be used, with all such purchases justified in writing and  
23 approved by the Chief Procurement Officer;
- 24 (27) leases, licenses, permits, exchanges or purchases of real property and all other real  
25 property transactions, including closing costs;
- 26 (28) postage or shipping Services;
- 27 (29) relocation of utility lines within an easement owned by a public utility which  
28 requires its own Contractors to move the utility lines;
- 29 (30) purchases necessary for the investigation of criminal activities, which, if  
30 purchased competitively, may compromise an investigation as determined by the  
31 Sheriff or designee in writing; all funds expended for this type of activity will be  
32 properly receipted and accounted for with supporting documentation maintained by  
33 the Sheriff's Department and reviewed on a quarterly basis by the County Manager or  
34 designee;
- 35 (31) Contracts for retirement benefits which are paid for directly by County  
36 Employees;
- 37 (32) a Contract for materials grown, processed or manufactured in this state by Small  
38 Businesses, cooperatives, community self-determination corporations or other such  
39 enterprises; prior to negotiating a Contract under this exemption, the Central

iii) The pay equity preference described herein shall not become available until the County Manager or designee establishes its own pay equity preference certification program or enters into an agreement with the State of New Mexico or one of its political subdivisions that allows the Central Purchasing Office to use its pay equity certification program.

(6) Limitation (percentage): The total amount of all preferences applied under this section including the applicable State preference, for the purchase of Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction in any single award shall not exceed 15%, with the limit on State preferences as set forth under the New Mexico State Procurement Code.

(7) County Preference Limitation (dollar amount): When applying the County preferences as set forth in this section, the total dollar amount of County preferences shall never exceed \$150,000.00.

(8) Protests: The procedures provided in the Ordinance governing protests and judicial review apply to a protest concerning the awarding of a Contract in violation of this section.

(9) This section shall not apply when the expenditure includes federal funds for the specific purchase is involved, or when the expenditure of grant funds includes a condition of which prohibits a local preference.

**Sec 2-368. SMALL PURCHASES**

(a) The Central Purchasing Office shall procure items of Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction having a value not exceeding \$100,000, excluding applicable state and local gross receipts taxes, in accordance with the applicable small purchase rules adopted by the Central Purchasing Office.

(1) Insofar as it is practical for small purchases of non-Professional Services, Construction or items of Tangible Personal Property having a value exceeding

- 1           \$20,000 but not exceeding \$100,000, no fewer than three businesses shall be solicited  
2           via written requests containing the Specifications for the procurement; written Quotes

- 4           (2) If three written Quotes cannot be obtained, the User shall document the reasons and  
5           include the document in the procurement file. Award shall be made to the business  
6           offering the lowest acceptable Quote.
- 7           (3) If the lowest Quote is not acceptable, the Central Purchasing Office must issue a

20       Architectural or Surveying Services, shall be accomplished in accordance with the  
21       provisions of the applicable sections of this Article. The Central Purchasing Office shall  
22       negotiate a Contract for the required Services at a fair and reasonable price to the County.
- 23       (e) Procurement requirements shall not be artificially divided so as to constitute a small  
24       purchase under this section.

25       **Sec 2-369.     SOLE SOURCE PROCUREMENT**

- 26       (a) A Contract for Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction may be awarded  
27       without competitive sealed bids or competitive sealed proposals, regardless of the  
28       estimated cost, when the Chief Procurement Officer or designee makes a written  
29       Determination, after conducting a good-faith review of available sources and consulting  
30       the User Department, that:

4 Purchasing Office shall post notice of the intent to award a Sole Source Contract on its  
5 web site. The notice shall identify at a minimum:

- 7 (2) The estimated amount and term of the Contract;
- 8 (3) A listing of the Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction procured under  
9 the Contract; and

17 **Sec 2-370. EMERGENCY PROCUREMENT**

- 18 (a) The Central Purchasing Office may make emergency procurements when there exists a  
19 threat to public health, welfare, safety or property requiring procurement under  
20 emergency conditions; provided that emergency procurements shall be made with  
21 competition as is practicable under the circumstances.
- 22 (b) An emergency condition is a situation that creates a threat to public health, welfare or  
23 safety such as may arise by reason of floods, fires, epidemics, riots, acts of terrorism,  
24 equipment failures or similar events and includes the planning and preparing for an  
25 emergency response. The existence of the emergency condition creates an immediate  
26 and serious need for items of Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction that  
27 cannot be met through normal procurement methods and the lack of which would  
28 seriously threaten:
- 29 (1) The functioning of government;
- 30 (2) The preservation or protection of property; or
- 31 (3) The health or safety of any Person.
- 32 (c) Emergency procurements shall not include the purchase or lease purchase of heavy road  
33 equipment.
- 34 (d) The Central Purchasing Office shall use due diligence in determining the basis for the  
35 emergency procurement and for the selection of the particular Contractor. The  
36 Determination shall be in writing and included in the procurement file.
- 37 (e) Within three business days of awarding an emergency procurement Contract, the Central  
38 Purchasing Office shall post on its web site the notice, identifying, at a minimum:
- 39 (1) The Contractor's name and address;

- 1           (2) The amount and term of the Contract;
- 2           (3) A listing of the Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction procured under
- 3           the Contract; and
- 4           (4) The justification for the procurement method.

8 **PROCUREMENT (AS A MEANS OF SOURCE SELECTION)**

- 9 (a)       Existing Government Contracts: Notwithstanding the other requirements of the
- 10         Ordinance, the Central Purchasing Office may Contract for Tangible Personal Property,
- 11         Services or Construction without use of competitive sealed bids or competitive sealed
- 12         proposals as follows:
  - 13         (1) at a price equal to or less than the Contractor's current federal supply Contract price
  - 14             (GSA), providing the Contractor has indicated in writing a willingness to extend such

  - 25             External Procurement Unit or cooperative purchasing agency using competitive

  - 27             procurement laws and regulations applicable to that agency.
- 28 (b)       Cooperative Procurement:
  - 29         (1) The County may participate in, sponsor or administer a Cooperative Procurement
  - 30             agreement for the procurement of any items of Tangible Personal Property, Services
  - 31             or Construction with any other state agency, Local Public Body or External
  - 32             Procurement Unit in accordance with an agreement entered into and approved by the

8 **Sec 2-372. INSURANCE RELATED PURCHASES**

9 (a) Insurance coverage for the County, other than Employee health care and other voluntary  
10 Employee benefits, may be remarketed by a controlled bidding process through a broker  
11 under the direction of the County's Risk Management Department.

12 (b) Employee health care insurance and other voluntary Employee benefits shall be obtained  
13 in accordance with the procurement methods described in this Article.

14 (c) The selection of the County's broker responsible for the negotiation of insurance  
15 coverages for the County will be obtained in accordance with the procurement methods  
16 described in this Article.

17 **Sec 2-373. ANTIPOVERTY PROGRAM BUSINESS PURCHASES**

18 (a) Without regard to the bid requirements of this Article, the Central Purchasing Office may  
19 negotiate a Contract for materials grown, processed or manufactured in this state by  
20 Small Businesses, cooperatives, community self-determination corporations or other such  
21 enterprises designed and operated to alleviate poverty conditions and aided by state or  
22 federal antipoverty programs or through private philanthropy.

23 (b) Prior to negotiating a Contract under this section, a Central Purchasing Office shall make  
24 a Determination of the reasonableness of the price and the quality of the materials and  
25 that the public interest will best be served by the procurement.

26 **Sec 2-374. ASSISTANCE TO SMALL BUSINESS**

27 (a) The Central Purchasing Office shall develop training programs to assist small businesses  
28 in learning how to do business with the County.

29 (b) The Central Purchasing Office may make special provisions for progress payments as  
30 such office or officer may deem reasonably necessary to encourage procurement from  
31 small businesses in accordance with procedural rules promulgated by the Central  
32 Purchasing Office.

33 (c) The Chief Procurement Officer may reduce the bid bond, performance bond or payment  
34 bond to encourage procurement from small businesses, except as otherwise provided by  
35 law.

36 **Sec 2-375. PUBLIC ACQUISITION OF AMERICAN MADE MOTOR VEHICLES**  
37 **REQUIRED**

38 (a) The County shall only acquire motor vehicles assembled in North America except for  
39 gas-electric hybrid vehicles until these vehicles are assembled in North America;

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1 provided that this section shall not apply to motor vehicles used for law enforcement  
2 purposes. For the purposes of this section, "motor vehicle" means a light-duty vehicle  
3 under eight thousand five hundred pounds.

4 **Sec 2-376. UNFAIR BUSINESS PRACTICES**

5 (a) For the purposes of this Section, "Unfair Business Practices" shall mean a system or  
6 pattern of acts or practices that a relevant federal or state enforcement agency has made a  
7 formal finding within the last three years to be discriminatory, deceptive, fraudulent, or  
8 abusive (or similar terms) under the New Mexico Unfair Practices Act, NMSA 1978, §  
9 57-12-1 et seq, or an applicable federal or other state consumer protection law relating to  
10 the subject matter of the procurement) or that have violated a relevant criminal statute, as  
11 evidenced by a public enforcement order or judgment, settlement with the enforcement  
12 agency or other formal finding by the relevant enforcement agency with regulatory  
13 enforcement authority under the applicable consumer protection law, or criminal  
14 conviction.

15 (b) The County finds that it is a priority to protect its interests and the public's trust by  
16 conducting its business with partners that are committed to and consistently demonstrate  
17 engaging in fair and responsible business practices. The general purpose and intent of this  
18 Section are to ensure to the maximum extent practicable that the County's contracting  
19 practices support conducting its business with partners who are committed to and  
20 consistently demonstrate engaging in fair and responsible business practices and avoid  
21 conducting its business with partners that engage in criminal or systematic deceptive,  
22 fraudulent or abusive business practices.

23 (c) Requirements:

24 (1) All RFBs and RFPs will include an Unfair Business Practices Disclosure Form for the  
25 reporting of all relevant violations that shall be submitted together with the bid or  
26 proposal;

27 (2) Any Person or entity who has reported, or failed to report, relevant violations  
28 constituting Unfair Business Practices as set forth in this Article may be subject to  
29 rejection of bid or proposal based on finding of non-Responsibility;

30 (3) All Contractors shall report to the Central Purchasing Office all additional Unfair  
31 Business Practices violations during the term of their agreement(s) with the County;

32 (4) Any Person or entity that is awarded a Contract with the County who has been found  
33 to engage in Unfair Business Practices as set forth in this Article may be subject to  
34 Contract termination.

35 (d) The County Manager or designee may waive the requirements of this section when it is in  
36 the best interests of the County.

37 **Sec 2-377. PROCUREMENT OF BANKING SERVICES**

38 (a) Socially Responsible Banking

39 (1) The Chief Procurement Officer, in conjunction with the Deputy County Manager for  
40 Finance, in selecting qualified depositories for County moneys, shall have the power

1 and duty to:

- 2 a. Require that prospective Offerors provide the County with data on their socially  
3 responsible banking practices;
- 4 b. Utilize socially responsible banking performance as a factor in determining the  
5 successful proposal;
- 6 c. Accept proposals for depository services only from financial institutions that  
7 have received a rating of "Outstanding" in their most recent Community  
8 Reinvestment Act review by the Office of the U.S. Comptroller of the  
9 Currency, U.S. Federal Reserve Bank or the Federal Deposit Insurance  
10 Corporation. The Chief Procurement Officer may waive this requirement,  
11 with written notice to the County Commission, in the event that no qualified  
12 Offerors apply, the federal program is no longer applicable, or to satisfy a  
13 compelling County need;
- 14 d. Include in Contracts for depository services a statement of work that provides a  
15 framework for socially responsible banking;
- 16 e. Establish relevant reporting criteria and timeframes to validate the statement of  
17 work.

18 (2) Socially responsible banking proposal criteria shall include, but are not limited to,  
19 community involvement and reinvestment; meeting community banking needs;  
20 supporting small business lending and community development; providing for home  
21 ownership and consumer credit; assisting distressed homeowners; and allowing for  
22 products and services that are advantageous for the County and its Residents.

23 (b) Statement of Work:

- 24 (1) The statement of work for socially responsible banking tasks shall include, but is not  
25 limited to, the following:
  - 26 a. Community Involvement and Reinvestment
    - 27 i) The bank will report to the County on its efforts to invest in low- and  
28 moderate- income areas and minority census tracts.
    - 29 ii) The bank, through its community investment program or other similar  
30 program, will collaborate and support annually at least one designated non-  
31 profit organization focused on providing financial services, education and  
32 asset building for low-income people in the County.
    - 33 iii) The bank, through its community investment program or other similar  
34 program, will collaborate with and support annually at least one organization  
35 that provides free tax preparation Services in the County that target lower-  
36 income workers to help them take advantage of the Earned Income Tax Credit  
37 and other tax credits.
    - 38 iv) The bank will report on its community development activities (such as  
39 investments, lending, and Services) to demonstrate the bank's response to the  
40 credit, financial and banking needs of low- to moderate- income individuals in  
41 the County and surrounding areas.

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1 v) The bank will provide the County with reasonable notice of branch  
2 closures and openings within the County, including the reasons for any  
3 closures.

4 b. Community Banking Needs

5 i) The bank will continue to support and participate in programs that strive to  
6 reach traditionally underserved populations as described in the Community  
7 Reinvestment Act. These programs may include unbanked, under banked, and  
8 low-income populations. The bank will provide free or low-cost services and  
9 products and increase access to these underserved populations.

10 ii) The bank will make its best effort to offer consumers prepaid debit cards  
11 with the primary features and criteria outlined in the Cities for Financial  
12 Empowerment (CFE) Coalition's Bank on National Account Standards.

13 iii) The bank will provide easy-to-understand fee schedules and make a  
14 reasonable effort to offer fair, responsible, and affordable small-dollar loans.

15 c. Small Business Lending and Community Development. The bank will provide  
16 a single point of contact for business lending and partnership, and will  
17 participate as agreed in small business trade fairs, outreach or educational  
18 opportunities.

19 d. Home Ownership and Consumer Credit

20 i) The bank will provide a single point of contact in its loan servicing group  
21 for the County Manager or designee.

22 ii) The bank will participate in outreach and educational opportunities aimed  
23 at salvaging distressed home mortgages, will collaborate with HUD-certified  
24 housing counseling services, and will inform customers who do not qualify for  
25 home loans or other products about local non-profit credit and debt counseling  
26 services.

27 (2) The Chief Procurement Officer, in conjunction with the Deputy County Manager for  
28 Finance, may propose exceptions to this statement of work, subject to Board approval  
29 by resolution, in future Contract cycles.

30 (c) Reporting:

31 (1) Any banking Contract must include a requirement that the bank provide the following  
32 reporting:

33 a. Residential lending information - The bank will provide the total number and  
34 the total dollar amount of Residential loans for one- to four-family dwellings  
35 applied for and originated during the previous calendar year in each of the  
36 following listed categories. The data shall be provided for the entire County  
37 by zip code. For home loans, fixed-rate loans shall be reported separately from  
38 adjustable-rate loans.

39 i) Home purchase loans, both federally insured and conventional loans;

40 ii) Refinancing of home loans;

- 1                   iii) Home improvement loans;
- 2                   iv) Home equity loans;
- 3                   v) Multi-family loans;

- 6                   interest rate reductions, forbearance, principal reduction, or repayment plans
- 7                   in which the outstanding loan amount increases, and an indication of whether
- 8                   the modification was executed under the federal Home Affordable
- 9                   Modification Program (HAMP), another federal program or the institution's
- 10                  own modification program;
- 11                  viii) Short sales, deeds in lieu, and other mechanisms besides loan
- 12                  modifications that avoid foreclosure;

- 15                  and the total dollar amount of small business loans originated during the
- 16                  previous calendar year for the entire County by zip code, and for minority-

- 19                  separately from loans to small businesses with annual revenues under \$1
- 20                  million. The bank may use data reporting procedures mandated by the federal

- 22                  c. Community development loans and investments - The bank will provide the
- 23                  number and dollar amount of community development loans and investments
- 24                  including loans and investments for affordable housing, small business
- 25                  development, economic development and community facilities for the entire
- 26                  County by zip code or neighborhood. The bank may use definitions of
- 27                  community development found in federal Community Reinvestment Act
- 28                  regulations. For each loan and investment, the bank will indicate if the loan or
- 29                  investment was for affordable housing, small business development, economic
- 30                  development, community facilities and other such categories requested by the
- 31                  Director.
- 32                  d. Consumer loan data - The number and dollar amount of consumer loans for the
- 33                  entire County by zip code. Price information shall be reported in a manner

- 35                  e. Checking, savings and loan products - Information on selected checking,

2 **Sec 2-378. CONTRACTS**

3 (a) Contract Approval: The County Manager or designee shall have the authority to approve  
4 all Contracts for the County; **Contracts in excess of any amounts adopted by resolution of**  
5 **the Board shall be approved by the Board in accordance with the requirement of the**  
6 **applicable resolution.**

7 (b) Contract Classifications: The Chief Procurement Officer shall determine the use of  
8 standard and specialized Contracts including but not limited to Definite Quantity  
9 Contracts, Indefinite Quantity Contracts and Price Agreements (including Cost-Plus-  
10 Percentage-of-Cost Contracts), as required acting in the best interest of the County;  
11 provided that the County shall not enter into any Contract for Construction which is a  
12 Cost-Plus-Percentage-of-Cost Contracts, unless the Contract meets the requirements in  
13 this Article for an Emergency purchase or is determined by the Chief Procurement  
14 Officer to be in the best interest of the County. A cost-reimbursement Contract may be  
15 used when such Contract is likely to be less costly or it is impracticable to otherwise  
16 obtain the items of Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction required.

17 (c) Contract Clauses: All County Contracts shall include provisions necessary to define the  
18 responsibilities and rights of the parties to the Contract. The Chief Procurement Officer  
19 shall include uniform clauses that protect the best interest of the County, including but  
20 not limited to the following subjects:

- 21 (1) Unilateral right of the County to order in writing:
  - 22 a. Changes in the work within the scope of the Contract; and
  - 23 b. Temporary stoppage of the work or the delay of performance;
- 24 (2) Variations occurring between estimated quantities of work in a Contract and actual  
25 quantities;
- 26 (3) Liquidated damages;
- 27 (4) Permissible excuses for delay or nonperformance;
- 28 (5) Termination of the Contract for default;
- 29 (6) Termination of the Contract in whole or in part for the convenience of the County;
- 30 (7) Assignment clauses providing for the assignment by the Contractor to the County of  
31 causes of action for violation of state or federal antitrust statutes;
- 32 (8) Identification of subcontractors by Bidders; and
- 33 (9) Uniform subcontract clauses in Contracts.
- 34 (10) Insurance provisions (if applicable)

35 (d) The County shall include a clause in Contracts imposing late payment charges against the  
36 County in the amount and under the conditions stated in in this Article.

37 (e) Price Adjustments: Adjustments in price shall be computed in one or more of the  
38 following ways as specified in the Contract:

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- 1 (1) In such other manner as the Contracting parties may mutually agree; or  
2 (2) In the absence of agreement by the parties, by a unilateral Determination reasonably  
3 computed by the County of the costs attributable to the events or conditions.
- 4 (f) Multi-year Contracts
- 5 (1) Prerequisites. Prior to the use of a multi-year Contract, the Central Purchasing Office  
6 shall determine that:
- 7 a. The estimated requirements cover the period of the Contract and are reasonably  
8 firm and continuing; and
- 9 b. The Contract will serve the best interests of the County.
- 10 (2) A multi-year Contract for items of Tangible Personal Property, Services or  
11 Construction except for Professional Services may be entered into for any period of  
12 time deemed to be in the best interests of County not to exceed ten years.
- 13 (3) A multi-year Contract for Professional Services may be entered into for any period of  
14 time not to exceed six years, including all extensions, except for the following:
- 15 a. Contracts for the Services of trustees, escrow agents, registrar, paying agents,  
16 letter of credit issuers and other forms of credit enhancement; and other  
17 similar Services, excluding bond attorneys, underwriters and financial  
18 advisors with regard to the issuance, sale and delivery of public securities,  
19 may be for the life of the securities or as long as the securities remain  
20 outstanding;
- 21 b. Contracts for Services relating to measurement and verification of  
22 conservation-related cost savings and utility cost savings pursuant to the  
23 Public Facility Energy Efficiency and Water Conservation Act; and
- 24 (4) For Construction, Architectural, and Engineering Services provided for specific  
25 projects already in progress, the Chief Procurement Officer, by written  
26 Determination, may approve an extension beyond a multi-year term set forth in this  
27 Section.
- 28 (5) Availability of funds: Payment and Contractor performance obligations for  
29 succeeding fiscal periods are subject to the availability and appropriation of funds.
- 30 (6) Cancellation: If funds are not appropriated or otherwise made available to support  
31 continuation of the multi-year Contract, the Contract shall be cancelled.
- 32 (g) Multiple Source Award: A Multiple Source Award may be made pursuant to the  
33 competitive sealed bid or competitive sealed proposal requirements of this Article when  
34 awards to two or more Bidders or Offerors are necessary for adequate delivery or service.  
35 Multiple source awards shall not be made when a single award will meet the needs of the  
36 County without sacrifice of economy or service. A Multiple Source Award shall be  
37 based upon the lowest Responsible bid as identified by Competitive Sealed Bids or most  
38 highly qualified as identified by Competitive Sealed Proposals.

39 **Sec 2-379. PROCUREMENT OF USED ITEMS**

- 40 (a) When procuring used items of Tangible Personal Property, the estimated cost of which

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1 exceeds \$20,000, shall request Quotes as though the items were new, adding  
2 Specifications that permit used items under conditions which may include but are not  
3 limited to:

- 4 (1) Requiring a written warranty for at least 90 days after date of delivery; and  
5 (2) An independent "certificate of working order" by a qualified mechanic or appraiser.

6 (b) All purchases of used items under \$20,000 shall be made at the Best Obtainable Price.

7 (c) The price paid for used items, including all fees and applicable surcharges, shall not  
8 exceed the current value established by:

- 9 (1) The current book value established by any well-recognized market-value guide or  
10 publication, where such information is available;  
11 (2) Where such information is not available, price shall not exceed the value as  
12 established (a) by appraisal, or (b) by the price of comparable goods;  
13 (3) The provisions of this section shall apply to the purchase of used items by auction,  
14 through private sale, or through public sale.

15 **Sec 2-380. TRADE IN OR EXCHANGE OF USED ITEMS**

16 (a) The Central Purchasing Office, when trading in or exchanging used items of Tangible  
17 Personal Property the estimated value of which exceeds five thousand dollars (\$5,000) as  
18 part-payment on the procurement of new items of Tangible Personal Property, shall:

- 19 (1) have two written Quotes for purchase of the property at a specified price; or  
20 (2) have an independent appraisal made of the items to be traded in or exchanged, which  
21 shall be in writing, shall be made part of the procurement file and shall be a Public  
22 Record.  
23 (3) contain notice in applicable Request for Bids or Request for Proposals to prospective  
24 Bidders or Offerors which includes the description and Specifications of the items to  
25 be traded in or exchanged, the appraised value of the items to be traded in or  
26 exchanged, and the location where the items to be traded in or exchanged may be  
27 inspected.

28 (b) Award shall be based upon the net bid. Bidders or Offerors shall compute their net bid or  
29 offer by deducting the appraised value or highest Quote of the items to be traded in or  
30 exchanged from the gross bid or offer on the new items of Tangible Personal Property to  
31 be procured. If an amount offered in trade is less than the appraised value or the highest  
32 Quote but is found to be a fair reflection of the current market, representative of the  
33 condition of the items of Tangible Personal Property and in the best interest of the  
34 County, the bid or offer may be accepted. Documentation of the terms of acceptance shall  
35 be in writing, shall be made a part of the procurement file and shall be a Public Record.

36 **Sec 2-381. RECEIPT, INSPECTION, AND PAYMENT**

37 (a) The User Department is responsible for inspecting and accepting or rejecting deliveries.  
38 The User Department shall determine whether the quantity is as specified in the Purchase  
39 Order or Contract and whether the quality conforms to the Specifications referred to or  
40 included in the Purchase Order or Contract. If inspection reveals that the delivery does

1 not conform to the quantity or quality specified in the Purchase Order or Contract, the  
2 User Department shall immediately notify the Central Purchasing Office. The User  
3 Department shall notify the vendor that the delivery has been rejected and shall order the  
4 vendor to promptly make a satisfactory replacement or supplementary delivery. In case  
5 the vendor fails to comply, the County shall have no obligation to pay for the  
6 nonconforming items of Tangible Personal Property.

7 (b) The County shall not issue payment without certification from the User Department  
8 stating that products, equipment or Services have been received or completed as  
9 specified.

10 (c) Prepayment shall be allowed when approved by the Chief Procurement Officer, or his/her  
11 designee.

12 (d) In the event of disputed invoices, unless otherwise agreed upon by the parties or unless  
13 otherwise specified in the RFB, RFP, or other solicitation, within twenty days from the  
14 date the invoice is received by the County, the Central Purchasing Office or User  
15 Department shall issue a written notification of full or partial rejection of the items of  
16 Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction.

17 (e) Except as otherwise provided herein, upon approval by the Central Purchasing Office or  
18 User Department that the items of Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction  
19 have been received and accepted, payment shall be tendered to the Contractor within  
20 thirty days of the date the invoice is received by the County. If payment is made by mail,  
21 the payment shall be deemed tendered on the date it is postmarked. After the thirtieth day  
22 from the date the invoice is received by the County, late payment charges shall be paid on  
23 the unpaid balance due on the Contract to the Contractor at the rate of one percent per  
24 month. For purchases funded by state or federal grants to the County, if the County has  
25 not received the funds from the federal or state funding agency, payments shall be  
26 tendered to the Contractor within five working days of receipt of funds from that funding  
27 agency.

28 (f) Late payment charges that differ from the provisions of this section may be assessed if  
29 specifically provided for by Contract or pursuant to tariffs approved by the New Mexico  
30 public utility commission or the public regulation commission.

31 **Sec 2-382. RIGHT TO INSPECT PLANT**

32 A Contract or a solicitation may include a provision permitting the County, at reasonable times,  
33 to inspect the facility or place of business of a Contractor or any subcontractor that is related to  
34 the performance of any Contract awarded or to be awarded.

35 **Sec 2-383. CONTRACT AUDIT**

36 The County shall be entitled to audit the books and records of a Contractor or any subcontractor  
37 under any negotiated Contract or subcontract to the extent that such books and records relate to  
38 the performance of such Contract or subcontract. Such books and records shall be maintained by  
39 the Contractor for a period of three years from the date of final payment under the prime  
40 Contract and by the subcontractor for a period of three years from the date of final payment  
41 under the subcontract unless a shorter period is otherwise authorized in writing.

1 **Sec 2-384. SPECIFICATIONS**

- 2 (a) All Specifications shall seek to promote overall economy for the purposes intended and  
3 encourage competition in satisfying the County's needs, and shall not be unduly  
4 restrictive. All Specifications shall be drafted so as to ensure maximum practicable  
5 competition and fulfill the requirements of the County. In preparing Specifications, if, in  
6 the opinion of the Central Purchasing Office, a proposed component is of a nature that  
7 would restrict the number of Responsible Bidders or Responsible Offerors and thereby  
8 limit competition, if practicable, the Central Purchasing Office shall draft the  
9 Specifications without the component and procure the component by issuing a separate  
10 Request for Bids or Request for Proposals or by entering into a Sole Source procurement.
- 11 (b) A Brand-Name or Equal Specification may be used when the Central Purchasing Office  
12 determines that only the identified Brand-Name item will satisfy the needs of the County.  
13 Should the essential characteristics of the Brand-Names included in the Specifications be  
14 commonly known in the industry or trade, such a detailed description is not necessary.  
15 Where a Brand-Name or Equal Specification is used in a solicitation, the solicitation shall  
16 contain explanatory language that the use of a Brand-Name is for the purpose of  
17 describing the standard of quality, performance and characteristics desired and is not  
18 intended to limit or restrict competition. The Central Purchasing Office or the User  
19 Department shall seek to identify sources from which the designated Brand-Name items  
20 can be obtained and shall solicit such sources to achieve whatever degree of price  
21 competition is practicable.
- 22 (c) The County shall not accept any bid or proposal from a Person who directly participated  
23 in the preparation of Specifications. This prohibition does not extend to vendors who  
24 have suggested changes to Specifications that were approved by the County during the  
25 course of a publicly-solicited, formal bid or proposal process.
- 26 (d) The requirements of this section regarding the purposes and non-restrictiveness of  
27 Specifications shall also apply to all Specifications prepared other than by County  
28 personnel, including, but not limited to, those prepared by architects, engineers and  
29 designers.

30 **Sec 2-385. PROTEST AND APPEALS**

- 31 (a) Any Bidder or Offeror who is aggrieved in connection with a solicitation or award of a  
32 Contract may protest to the Chief Procurement Officer. The protest shall be submitted in  
33 writing within fifteen calendar days after knowledge of the facts or occurrences giving  
34 rise to the protest.
- 35 (b) In the event of a timely protest, the Central Purchasing Office shall not proceed further  
36 with the procurement unless it makes a Determination that the award of the Contract is  
37 necessary to protect substantial interests of the County. A procurement shall not be  
38 halted after a Contract has been awarded merely because a protest has been filed. After a  
39 Contract has been awarded, the Central Purchasing Office may, in its sole discretion, halt  
40 a procurement in exceptional circumstances or for good cause shown.
- 41 (c) The Central Purchasing Office shall have the authority to take any action reasonably  
42 necessary to resolve a protest of an aggrieved Bidder or Offeror. This authority shall be  
43 exercised in accordance with this section but shall not include the authority to award

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- 1 money damages or attorneys' fees.
- 2 (d) The Central Purchasing Office shall promptly issue a Determination relating to the  
3 protest. The Determination shall:
- 4 (1) state the reasons for the action taken; and
- 5 (2) inform the protestant of the right to judicial review of the Determination pursuant to  
6 this Article.
- 7 (e) The written Determination shall immediately be sent via certified mail to the protestant  
8 and otherwise provided via standard mail or electronically to other Bidders or Offerors  
9 involved in the procurement.
- 10 (f) The Chief Procurement Officer shall promulgate procedural rules for the resolution of  
11 protests under this Article, provided that the County shall not have the authority to award  
12 money damages or attorneys' fees.

13 **Sec 2-386. REMEDIES PRIOR TO EXECUTION OF CONTRACT**

14 If prior to the execution of a valid, written Contract by all parties and necessary approval  
15 authorities, the Central Purchasing Office makes a Determination that a solicitation or proposed  
16 award of the proposed Contract is in violation of law, then the solicitation or proposed award  
17 shall be canceled.

18 **Sec 2-387. RATIFICATION OR TERMINATION AFTER EXECUTION OF**  
19 **CONTRACT**

- 20 (a) If after the execution of a valid, written Contract by all parties and necessary approval  
21 authorities, the Central Purchasing Office makes a Determination that a solicitation or  
22 award of the Contract was in violation of law and if the business awarded the Contract  
23 did not act fraudulently or in bad faith:
- 24 (1) the Contract may be ratified, affirmed, and revised to comply with law, provided that  
25 a Determination is made that doing so is in the best interests of the County; or
- 26 (2) the Contract may be terminated, and the Contractor shall be compensated for the  
27 actual expenses reasonably incurred under the Contract plus a reasonable profit prior  
28 to termination.

29 **Sec 2-388. JUDICIAL REVIEW**

30 All actions authorized by the Ordinance for judicial review of a Determination shall be filed  
31 pursuant to the provisions of Section 39-3-1.1 NMSA 1978.

32 **Sec 2-389. VENDOR SUSPENSION AND DEBARMENT**

- 33 (a) The Chief Procurement Officer, after reasonable notice to the business involved, shall  
34 have authority to recommend to the Board the Suspension or Debarment of a business for  
35 cause from consideration for award of Contracts if after reasonable investigation, he or  
36 she finds that a Person has engaged in conduct that constitutes cause for Debarment.
- 37 (b) The term of a Suspension pursuant to this section shall not exceed three months;  
38 however, if a Person, including a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor, has been charged with a  
39 criminal offense that would be a cause for Debarment, the Suspension shall remain in

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1 effect until the criminal charge is resolved and the Person is debarred or the reason for  
2 Suspension no longer exists.

3 (c) The Chief Procurement Officer, after reasonable notice to the Person involved, shall have  
4 authority to recommend to the County Manager the Debarment of Person(s) for cause  
5 from consideration for award of Contracts. The Debarment shall not be for a period of  
6 more than three years. The authority to debar shall be exercised only upon reasonable  
7 notice and a hearing prior to Debarment.

8 (d) The causes for Debarment or Suspension occurring within three years of the date final  
9 action on a procurement is taken include but are not limited to the following:

10 (1) criminal conviction of a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor for commission of a criminal  
11 offense related to obtaining unlawfully or attempting to obtain a public or private  
12 Contract or subcontract, or related to the unlawful performance of such Contract or  
13 subcontract;

14 (2) civil judgment against a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor for a civil violation related to  
15 obtaining unlawfully or attempting to obtain a public or private Contract or  
16 subcontract, or related to the unlawful performance of such Contract or subcontract;

17 (3) conviction of a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor under state or federal statutes related to  
18 embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, fraud, falsification or destruction of records,  
19 making false statements or receiving stolen property or for violation of federal or  
20 state tax laws;

21 (4) conviction of a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor under state or federal antitrust statutes  
22 relating to the submission of offers;

23 (5) criminal conviction against a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor for any other offense  
24 related to honesty, integrity or business ethics;

25 (6) civil judgment or settlement with enforcement agency against a Bidder, Offeror or  
26 Contractor for a civil violation related to honesty, integrity or business ethics;

27 (7) civil judgment or settlement with enforcement agency against a Bidder, Offeror or  
28 Contractor pursuant to the New Mexico Unfair Trade Practices Act or other similar  
29 act from another state or the United States Government;

30 (8) violation by a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor of Contract provisions, as set forth in this  
31 paragraph, of a character that is reasonably regarded by the Chief Procurement  
32 Officer to be so serious as to justify Suspension or Debarment action, including:

33 a. willful failure to perform in accordance with one or more Contracts; or

34 b. a history of failure to perform or of unsatisfactory performance of one or more  
35 Contracts; provided that this failure or unsatisfactory performance has  
36 occurred within a reasonable time preceding the decision to impose  
37 Debarment; and provided further that failure to perform or unsatisfactory  
38 performance caused by acts beyond the control of the Contractor shall not be  
39 considered to be a basis for Debarment;

40 (9) any other cause that the Chief Procurement Officer determines to be so serious and  
41 compelling as to affect Responsibility as a Contractor; or

1 (10) for a willful violation by a Bidder, Offeror or Contractor of the provisions of this  
2 Ordinance.

3 (e) As used in this section, the terms "Bidder", "Offeror" and "Contractor" include  
4 principals, officers, directors, owners, partners and managers of the Bidder, Offeror or  
5 Contractor.

6 (f) The Chief Procurement Officer shall promulgate procedural rules to adjudicate all  
7 Debarments and Suspensions under this Section.

8 **Sec 2-390. ETHICAL CONDUCT**

9 (a) Bribes, Gratuities, and Kickbacks: All Contracts and solicitations thereof shall contain  
10 references to the New Mexico criminal statutes prohibiting bribes, Gratuities and  
11 kickbacks.

12 (b) Campaign Contribution Disclosure and Prohibition:

13 (1) Any Prospective Contractor shall disclose all campaign contributions given by the  
14 Contractor, Family Member or representative to any public official of the County  
15 during the two-years prior to the date on which a proposal is submitted or, in the case  
16 of a Sole Source or small purchase Contract for Professional Services, the two-years  
17 prior to the Contract date, if the aggregate total of contributions given by the  
18 Prospective Contractor or a Family Member or Representative of the Prospective  
19 Contractor to the public official exceeds two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) over the  
20 two-year period.

21 (2) The disclosure shall indicate the date, the amount, the nature and the purpose of the  
22 contribution. The disclosure statement shall be on a form developed and made  
23 available electronically by the County. The County shall indicate on the form the  
24 name or names of every Applicable Public Official, if any, for which disclosure is  
25 required by a Prospective Contractor for each competitive sealed proposal, sole  
26 source or small purchase Contract. The form shall be filed as part of the competitive  
27 sealed proposal, or in the case of a sole source or small purchase Contract, on the date  
28 on which the Contractor signs the Contract.

29 (3) A Prospective Contractor submitting a disclosure statement pursuant to this section  
30 who has not contributed to an Applicable Public Official, whose Family Members  
31 have not contributed to an Applicable Public Official or whose representatives have  
32 not contributed to an Applicable Public Official, shall make a statement that no  
33 contribution was made.

34 (4) A Prospective Contractor or a Family Member or Representative of the Prospective  
35 Contractor shall not give a campaign contribution or other thing of value to an  
36 Applicable Public Official or the Applicable Public Official's employees during the  
37 Pendency of the Procurement Process or during the pendency of negotiations for a  
38 sole source or small purchase Contract.

39 (5) A solicitation or proposed award for a proposed Contract may be canceled or a  
40 Contract that is executed may be ratified or terminated pursuant to this Article if:

41 a. a Prospective Contractor fails to submit a fully completed disclosure statement

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1                   pursuant to this section or violates any provision of the Bernalillo County  
2                   Code of Conduct; or

3                   b. a Prospective Contractor or Family Member or Representative of the  
4                   Prospective Contractor gives a campaign contribution or other thing of value  
5                   to an Applicable Public Official or the Applicable Public Official's employees  
6                   during the Pendency of the Procurement Process.

7                   (6) As used in this section:

8                   a. "Applicable Public Official" means a Person elected to an office or a Person  
9                   appointed to complete a term of an elected office, who has the authority to  
10                  award or influence the award of the Contract for which the Prospective  
11                  Contractor is submitting a competitive sealed proposal or who has the  
12                  authority to negotiate a sole source or small purchase Contract that may be  
13                  awarded without submission of a sealed competitive proposal;

14                  b. "Family Member" means a spouse, father, mother, child, father-in-law, mother-  
15                  in-law, daughter-in-law or son-in-law of: (i) a Prospective Contractor, if the  
16                  Prospective Contractor is a natural Person; or (ii) an owner of a Prospective  
17                  Contractor;

18                  c. "Pendency of the Procurement Process" means the time period commencing  
19                  with the public notice of the Request for Proposals and ending with the award  
20                  of the Contract or the cancellation of the Request for Proposals;

21                  d. "Prospective Contractor" means a Person or business that is subject to the  
22                  competitive sealed proposal process set forth in this Article or is not required  
23                  to submit a competitive sealed proposal because that Person or business  
24                  qualifies for a sole source or small purchase Contract; and

25                  e. "Representative of the Prospective Contractor" means an officer or director of a  
26                  corporation, a member or manager of a limited liability corporation, a partner  
27                  of a partnership or a trustee of a trust of the Prospective Contractor.

28                  (c)   Contingent Fees:

29                  (1) It is unlawful for a Person or business to be retained or for a business to retain a  
30                  Person or business to solicit or secure a Contract upon an agreement or understanding  
31                  that the compensation is contingent upon the award of the Contract, except for  
32                  retention of bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial selling  
33                  agencies for the purpose of securing business and Persons or businesses employed by  
34                  the County which are providing Professional Services to the County in anticipation of  
35                  the receipt of federal or state grants or loans;

36                  (2) The prohibition against contingent fees shall not apply to the procurement of legal  
37                  services upon approval of the Board.

38                  (d)   Conflict of Interest: Employees and other individuals representing the County shall  
39                  comply with the County's Ordinances, policies, procedures, and administrative  
40                  instructions governing conflicts of interest, and the County Code of Conduct and  
41                  Governmental Conduct Act, Section 10-16-1 et seq., NMSA 1978.

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- 1 (e) Unlawful Employee Participation:
- 2 (1) It is unlawful for any County Employee to participate directly or indirectly in a
- 3 procurement when the Employee or any member of the Employee's Immediate
- 4 Family has a Financial Interest pertaining to the procurement.
- 5 (2) An Employee or any member of an Employee's Immediate Family who holds a
- 6 Financial Interest in a disclosed blind trust shall not be deemed to have a Financial
- 7 Interest with regard to matters pertaining to that trust.
- 8 (f) Contemporaneous Employment Prohibition: It shall be unlawful for any County
- 9 Employee who is participating directly or indirectly in the procurement process to
- 10 become or to be, while such an Employee, the Employee of any Person or business
- 11 Contracting with the County. The County Manager or designee may grant a waiver from
- 12 unlawful Employee participation as set forth in the Ordinance upon making a
- 13 Determination that:
- 14 (1) the contemporaneous employment or Financial Interest of the Employee has been
- 15 publicly disclosed;
- 16 (2) the Employee will be able to perform his procurement functions without actual or
- 17 apparent bias or favoritism; and
- 18 (3) the Employee participation is in the best interests of the County.
- 19 (g) Confidential Information: It shall be unlawful for any Employee or former Employee
- 20 knowingly to use any information which is available to an Employee because of the
- 21 Employee's status as an Employee of the County and which is not a matter of public
- 22 knowledge or available to the public on request for actual or anticipated personal gain, or
- 23 for the actual or anticipated personal gain of any other Person.
- 24 (h) Recovery of Value: The value of anything transferred or received in breach of the ethical
- 25 standards of this section by an Employee or a nonemployee may be recovered from both
- 26 Employee and nonemployee.

27 **Sec 2-391. PENALTIES**

- 28 (a) Any business or Person that willfully violates any provision of the Ordinance may be
- 29 subject to a civil penalty of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each
- 30 violation with any penalty collected under the provisions of this section shall be credited
- 31 to the County's general fund.
- 32 (b) Upon a showing that a subcontractor made a kickback to a prime Contractor or a higher-
- 33 tier subcontractor in connection with the award of a subcontract or order thereunder, it is
- 34 conclusively presumed that the amount thereof was included in the price of the
- 35 subcontract or order and ultimately borne by the County. An amount equal to the
- 36 kickback is imposed as a civil penalty by the County upon the recipient and upon the
- 37 subcontractor making such kickbacks in addition but pursuant to the terms and conditions
- 38 of subsection (a) above, and/or
- 39 (c) Any business or Person that willfully violates the Ordinance may be criminally
- 40 prosecuted and subject to penalties contained in Section 1-6 of the Bernalillo County
- 41 Code.

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- 1 (d) Any business or Person that willfully violates any provision of the Ordinance contrary to  
2 the New Mexico Criminal Code may be referred to the appropriate authorities for felony  
3 or misdemeanor prosecution.

4 **DIVISION 2. – PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS; CONSTRUCTION**

5 **Sec 2-392. CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS**

- 6 (a) The award and execution of Contracts for major Construction, including but not limited  
7 to roads, bridges, airports, buildings and dams, shall be made by the Board or designee by  
8 resolution. The Chief Procurement Officer or designee responsible for the procurement  
9 shall give notice to prospective Bidders pursuant to this Article.
- 10 (b) All Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction for Capital Projects, shall be  
11 procured through the Central Purchasing Office in accordance with all applicable  
12 policies, procedures, laws, regulations, rules, statutes and Ordinances.
- 13 (c) Upon award of a Construction Contract in excess of \$25,000, performance and payment  
14 bonds shall be delivered by the Contractor. The performance bond shall be in an amount  
15 equal to 100% of the Contract price unless it is determined by the Central Purchasing  
16 Office that a lower bond, no less than 50%, is in the best interest of the County. The  
17 payment bond shall be for an amount that is approved by the County, but in an amount  
18 that satisfactorily covers the subcontractors on the project.
- 19 (d) Bid Security: When applicable, Bidders for Construction Contracts must provide bid  
20 security when the price is estimated to exceed \$25,000. The bid security shall be equal to  
21 at least five percent of the amount of the bid and shall be (1) a bond provided by a surety  
22 company authorized to do business in this state; or (2) or otherwise supplied in a form  
23 satisfactory to the County.
- 24 (e) Prior to submitting a bid or proposal for a public works project, if the Central Purchasing  
25 Office, or a Responsible Bidder or Responsible Offeror determines that there is only one  
26 source for a specific Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction that is required  
27 in the Specifications, the Central Purchasing Office, Responsible Bidder or Responsible  
28 Offeror may require any bid or offer submitted by a subcontractor or supplier to price  
29 separately the specific Tangible Personal Property, Services or Construction.
- 30 (f) Except to the extent necessary to ensure that a surety company meets the requirements of  
31 Subsection A of Section 13-4-18 NMSA 1978, an Employee of the County, or a Person  
32 acting or purporting to act on behalf of that Employee, shall not require a Bidder or an  
33 Offeror in a procurement for a Construction Contract pursuant to this Article to make  
34 application or furnish financial data for a surety bond or to obtain a surety bond from a  
35 particular surety company, insurance company, broker or agent in connection with the bid  
36 or proposal.
- 37 (g) A subcontractor may be required to provide a performance and payment bond on a public  
38 works project.
- 39 (h) Public Works Minimum Wage Act:
- 40 (1) Every proposed Construction Contract in excess of the minimum threshold set forth  
41 by state statute shall contain a provision stating the minimum wages to be paid

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1 various classes of laborers and mechanics. With respect to all such Contracts, the  
2 New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions (or successor agency) shall be  
3 contacted for a wage rate determination.

4 (2) Every Contract within the scope of the Public Works Minimum Wage Act [13-4-10 to  
5 13-4-17 NMSA 1978] shall contain further provision that in the event it is found by  
6 the director of the Labor Relations Division of the New Mexico Department of  
7 Workforce Solutions (or its successor) that any laborer or mechanic employed on the  
8 site of the project has been or is being paid as a result of a willful violation a wage  
9 rate or fringe benefit rate less than the rates required, the County may, by written  
10 notice to the Contractor, subcontractor, employer or Person acting as a Contractor,  
11 terminate the right to proceed with the work or the part of the work as to which there  
12 has been a willful failure to pay the required wages or fringe benefits, and the County  
13 may prosecute the work to completion by Contract or otherwise, and the Contractor  
14 or Person acting as a Contractor and the Contractor's or Person's sureties shall be  
15 liable to the state for any excess costs occasioned thereby. Any party receiving notice  
16 of termination of a project or subcontract pursuant to the provisions of this section  
17 may appeal the finding of the director as provided in the Public Works Minimum  
18 Wage Act.

19 (3) In order to respond to a Request for Proposals or to be considered for award of any  
20 portion of a public works project that is subject to the Public Works Minimum Wage  
21 Act, the Contractor, serving as a prime Contractor or not, shall be registered with the  
22 Labor Relations Division of the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions (or  
23 its successor). Bidding documents issued or released by the County shall include a  
24 clear notification that each Contractor, prime Contractor or subcontractor is required  
25 to be registered pursuant to the Public Works Minimum Wage Act.

26 (4) The County shall not accept a bid on a public works project subject to the Public  
27 Works Minimum Wage Act from a prime Contractor that does not provide proof of  
28 required registration for itself.

29 (5) The Public Works Minimum Wage Act shall not be construed to supersede or impair  
30 a more stringent requirement under any authority granted by federal law to provide  
31 for the establishment of specified wage rates.

32 (i) Subcontractors Fair Practices Act

33 (1) For any public works project, the County shall evaluate bids and administer  
34 Contracts as they pertain to the listing of subcontractors in accordance with the  
35 requirements of the Subcontractors Fair Practices Act, Sections 13-4-31 through 13-  
36 4-42, NMSA 1978.

37 (j) Public Works Mediation

38 (1) State statute, NMSA Sections 13-4C-1 et seq., mandates that all disputes related to the  
39 performance of a public works project shall exhaust procedures set forth in the Public  
40 Works Mediation Act before seeking judicial relief. Disputes arising pursuant to the  
41 Public Works Minimum Wage Act, the Workers' Compensation Act, or disputes  
42 regarding an apprenticeship, are exempted from the mandatory public works  
43 mediation process.

1 (2) A dispute that arises under an arbitration clause of a Contract for a public works  
2 project that includes a clause in the Contract that requires arbitration is exempt from  
3 the provisions of the Public Works Mediation Act.

4 (3) When a public works project involves the expenditure of federal funds, the mediation  
5 process shall be conducted in accordance with mandatory applicable federal law and  
6 regulations. When mandatory applicable federal law or regulations are inconsistent  
7 with the Public Works Mediation Act, compliance with federal law or regulations  
8 shall constitute compliance with the Public Works Mediation Act.

9 **Sec 2-393. DESIGN AND BUILD PROJECT SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS**

10 (a) A design and build project may be authorized when the Chief Procurement Officer makes  
11 a Determination in writing that it is appropriate and in the best interest of the County to  
12 use the system on a specific project. The Determination shall be issued only after the  
13 Chief Procurement Officer has taken into consideration the following criteria, which shall  
14 be used as the minimum basis in determining when to use the design and build process:

15 (1) the extent to which the project requirements have been or can be adequately defined;

16 (2) time constraints for delivery of the project;

17 (3) the capability and experience of potential teams with the design and build process;

18 (4) the suitability of the project for use of the design and build process as concerns time,  
19 schedule, costs, and quality; and

20 (5) the capability of the County to manage the project, including experienced personnel  
21 or outside consultants, and to oversee the project with Persons who are familiar with  
22 the design and build process.

23 (b) When a Determination has been made by the Chief Procurement Officer that it is  
24 appropriate to use a design and build project delivery system, the design and build team  
25 shall include, as needed, a New Mexico registered engineer or architect and a Contractor  
26 properly licensed in New Mexico for the type of work required.

27 (c) Except as provided in Subsections (e) and (f) of this section, for each proposed design  
28 and build project, a two-phase procedure for awarding design and build Contracts shall be  
29 used and shall include at a minimum the following:

30 (1) during phase one, and prior to solicitation, documents shall be prepared for a Request  
31 for Qualifications by a New Mexico registered engineer or architect, either in-house  
32 or selected in accordance with applicable law, and shall include minimum  
33 qualifications, a scope of work statement and schedule, documents defining the  
34 project requirements, the composition of the selection committee and a description of  
35 the phase-two requirements and subsequent management needed to bring the project  
36 to completion. Design and build qualifications of responding firms shall be  
37 evaluated, and shall be short-listed in accordance with technical and qualifications-  
38 based criteria in a manner set forth in the solicitation; and

39 (2) during phase two, the short-listed firms shall be invited to submit detailed specific  
40 technical concepts or solutions, costs and scheduling. Unsuccessful firms may be  
41 paid a stipend to cover proposal expenses. After evaluation of these submissions,

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1 selection shall be made and the Contract awarded to the highest-ranked firm.

2 (d) Except as provided in Subsections (e) and (f) of this section, to ensure fair, uniform, clear  
3 and effective procedures that will strive for the delivery of a quality project on time and  
4 within budget, the Central Purchasing Office shall adopt procedural rules to be followed  
5 when procuring design and build projects.

6 (e) The requirements of Subsections (c) and (d) of this section do not apply to a design and  
7 build project and the services procured for the project if:

8 (1) the maximum allowable Construction cost of the project is four hundred thousand  
9 dollars (\$400,000) or less; and

10 (2) the only requirement for architects, engineers, landscape architects or surveyors is  
11 limited to either site improvements or adaption for a pre-engineered building or  
12 system.

13 (f) The procurement of a design and build project qualifying for exemptions pursuant to  
14 Subsection (e) of this section, including the Services of any architect, engineer, landscape  
15 architect, Construction Manager or surveyor needed for the project, shall be  
16 accomplished by competitive sealed bids in accordance with applicable law.

17 **Sec 2-394. CONSTRUCTION MANAGER AT RISK**

18 (a) As used in this section:

19 (1) "Construction Manager at Risk Delivery Method" means a Construction method  
20 wherein a Construction Manager at Risk provides a range of pre-Construction  
21 Services and Construction Management, including cost estimation and consultation  
22 regarding the design of the building project, preparation and coordination of bid  
23 packages, scheduling, cost control, value engineering and, while acting as the general  
24 Contractor during Construction, detailing the trade Contractor scope of work, holding  
25 the trade Contracts and other subcontracts, prequalifying and evaluating trade  
26 Contractors and subcontractors and providing management and Construction  
27 Services, all at a Guaranteed Maximum Price for which the Construction Manager at  
28 Risk is financially responsible;

29 (2) "Guaranteed Maximum Price" means the maximum amount to be paid by the County  
30 for the Construction of the facility, including the cost of the work, the general  
31 conditions and the fees charged by the Construction Manager at Risk.

32 (b) A Construction Manager at Risk Delivery Method may be used when the County  
33 determines that it is in its interest to use that method on a specific Construction project,  
34 provided that the Construction Manager at Risk shall be selected pursuant to the  
35 provisions of this section.

36 (c) The Central Purchasing Office shall form a selection committee of at least three members  
37 with at least one member being an architect or engineer. The Central Purchasing Office  
38 in conjunction with the selection committee shall develop an evaluation process,  
39 including a multiphase procedure consisting of two or three steps. A two-step procedure  
40 may be used when the total amount of money available for the project is less than five  
41 hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) and shall include a Request for Qualifications and

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- 1 an interview. A three-step procedure shall consist of a Request for Qualifications, a  
2 Request for Proposals and an interview.
- 3 (d) A Request for Qualifications shall be published in accordance with the notice  
4 requirements for Requests for Proposals provided in this Article and shall include at a  
5 minimum the following:
- 6 (1) a statement of the minimum qualifications for the Construction Manager at Risk,  
7 including the requirements for:
- 8 a. a Contractor's license for the type of work to be performed, issued pursuant to  
9 the Construction Industries Licensing Act [Chapter 60, Article 13 NMSA  
10 1978];
- 11 b. registration pursuant to Section 13-4-13.1 NMSA 1978; and
- 12 c. a minimum bond capacity.
- 13 (2) a statement of the scope of work to be performed, including:
- 14 a. the location of the project and the total amount of money available for the  
15 project;
- 16 b. a proposed schedule, including a deadline for submission of the statements of  
17 qualification;
- 18 c. specific project requirements and deliverables;
- 19 d. the composition of the selection committee;
- 20 e. a description of the process the selection committee shall use to evaluate  
21 qualifications;
- 22 f. a proposed Contract; and
- 23 g. a detailed statement of the relationships and obligations of all parties, including  
24 the Construction Manager at Risk, agents, such as an architect or engineer,  
25 and the County.
- 26 (3) a verification of the maximum allowable Construction cost; and
- 27 (4) a Request for a Proposal bond as required by this Article.
- 28 (e) The selection committee shall evaluate the statements of qualifications submitted and  
29 determine the Offerors that qualify for the Construction Manager at Risk. If the selection  
30 committee has chosen a three-step procedure, the committee shall issue a Request for  
31 Proposals to the Offerors that qualify.
- 32 (f) If the selection committee has chosen a two-step procedure, the committee shall rank the  
33 Persons that qualify based upon the statements of qualification and interview up to three  
34 of the highest-ranked Offerors.
- 35 (g) In a three-step procedure, the selection committee shall issue a Request for Proposals and  
36 evaluate the proposals pursuant to the requirements of this Article regarding the  
37 evaluation of Requests for Proposals except that:
- 38 (1) the Request for Proposals shall be sent only to those determined to be qualified

- 1           pursuant to this section;
- 2           (2) the selection committee shall evaluate the proposals and conduct interviews with up  
3           to three of the highest-ranked Offerors instead of negotiating with Responsible  
4           Offerors found to be reasonably likely to be selected; and
- 5           (3) pursuant to subsection (h) of this section, the Contract award may be made after the  
6           interviews.
- 7   (h)   After conducting interviews with the highest-ranked Offerors and after considering the  
8           factors listed in subsection (i) of this section, the selection committee shall recommend to  
9           the Central Purchasing Office the Offeror that will be most advantageous to the County.  
10          Should the Central Purchasing Office be unable to negotiate a satisfactory Contract with  
11          the Offeror considered to be the most qualified at a price determined to be fair and  
12          reasonable, negotiations with that Offeror shall be formally terminated. The Central  
13          Purchasing Office shall then undertake negotiations with the second most qualified  
14          Offeror. Failing accord with the second most qualified Offeror, the Central Purchasing  
15          Office shall formally terminate negotiations with the Offeror. The Central Purchasing  
16          Office shall then undertake negotiations with the third most qualified Offeror. Should the  
17          Central Purchasing Office be unable to negotiate a Contract with any of the Offerors  
18          selected by the committee, additional Offerors shall be ranked in order of their  
19          qualifications and the Central Purchasing Office shall continue negotiations in  
20          accordance with this section until a Contract is signed with a qualified Offeror or the  
21          procurement process is terminated and a new Request for Proposals is initiated.
- 22   (i)   In evaluating and ranking statements of qualifications, proposals and results of  
23          interviews, and in the final recommendation of a Construction Manager at Risk, the  
24          selection committee shall consider:
- 25          (1) the Offeror's experience with Construction of similar types of projects;
- 26          (2) the qualifications and experience of the Offeror's personnel and consultants and the  
27          role of each in the project;
- 28          (3) the plan for management actions to be undertaken on the project, including services to  
29          be rendered in connection with safety and the safety plan for the project;
- 30          (4) the Offeror's experience with the Construction Manager at Risk method; and
- 31          (5) all other selection criteria, as stated in the request for qualifications and the Request  
32          for Proposals.
- 33   (j)   Nothing in this section precludes the selection committee from recommending the  
34          termination of the selection procedure pursuant to the provisions of this Article and  
35          repeating the selection process pursuant to this section. Any material received by the  
36          selection committee in response to a solicitation that is canceled shall not be disclosed so  
37          as to be available to competing Offerors.
- 38   (k)   After a Contract is awarded, the selection committee shall make the names of all Offerors  
39          and the names of all Offerors selected for interview available for public inspection along  
40          with the selection committee's final ranking and evaluation scores. Offerors who were  
41          interviewed but not selected for Contract award shall be notified in writing.

- 1 (l) The Contract with the Construction Manager at Risk shall specify:  
2 (1) the Guaranteed Maximum Price; and  
3 (2) the percentage of the Guaranteed Maximum Price that the Construction Manager at  
4 Risk will perform with its own work force.
- 5 (m) The Construction Manager at Risk, in cooperation with the County, shall seek to develop  
6 subcontractor interest in the project and shall furnish to the County and any architect or  
7 engineer representing the County a list of subcontractors who state in writing that they  
8 are a Responsible Bidder or a Responsible Offeror, including suppliers who are to furnish  
9 materials or equipment fabricated to a special design and from whom proposals or bids  
10 will be requested for each principal portion of the project. The County and its architect  
11 or engineer shall promptly reply in writing to the Construction Manager at Risk if the  
12 County, architect or engineer knows of any objection to a listed subcontractor or supplier,  
13 provided that the receipt of the list shall not require the County, architect or engineer to  
14 investigate the qualifications of proposed subcontractors or suppliers, nor shall it waive  
15 the right of the County, architect or engineer later to object to or reject any proposed  
16 subcontractor or supplier.
- 17 (n) The Construction Manager at Risk shall assist the Central Purchasing Office with:  
18 (1) conducting pre-bid or pre-proposal meetings;  
19 (2) advising the County about bidding or proposals;  
20 (3) drafting of the Contracts; and  
21 (4) evaluating submissions by Responsible Bidders and Offerors.

22 **DIVISION 3. – PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS; PROFESSIONAL SERVICES**

23 **Sec 2-395. SELECTION ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

- 24 (a) Proposal Guidelines: In order for a consultant to be eligible to perform Professional  
25 Services of architects, engineers, landscape architects, Construction Managers and  
26 surveyors for the County, all work must be performed under the direct supervision of a  
27 registered New Mexico Professional Engineer (or land surveyor, architect or landscape  
28 architect, if applicable). Procurement involving the expenditure of federal funds must be  
29 conducted in accordance with the mandatory applicable federal laws and regulations.
- 30 (b) Submittal Requirements and Scoring Criteria: Submittal requirements and scoring criteria  
31 shall be specified in each request for proposal (RFP). Proposals which do not contain all  
32 of the mandatory information in their proposals may be considered incomplete and may  
33 not be considered by the Selection Advisory Committee.
- 34 (c) Required Proposal Format: Proposal format is discretionary. Any specific requirements  
35 or limits will be defined in each request for proposal as appropriate.
- 36 (d) Pre-Proposal Conference: A pre-proposal conference to answer questions may be held  
37 during the advertising period. Notice of the pre-proposal conference will be included in  
38 the request for proposal (RFP).
- 39 (e) Selection Process: The Selection Advisory Committee and the Central Purchasing Office

1 will review each proposal to ensure that it is complete in all required elements. Any  
2 proposal that is incomplete may be deemed non-Responsive and may not be scored. All  
3 Responsive proposals will be reviewed and scored by each individual committee member  
4 in accordance with the provisions of the RFP. The Selection Advisory Committee will  
5 collate scores and determine those firms, if any, which may be interviewed.

6 (f) Interviews (if applicable): Prior to the interviews, the Selection Advisory Committee  
7 shall agree on a rating system combining the aspects of the written proposal, any required  
8 submittals and the interviews. At the selection interviews, the Selection Advisory  
9 Committee shall rate all interviewed Offerors. The combined rating shall be used to  
10 determine the final ranking of the firms for negotiations. The Selection Advisory  
11 Committee's final ranking and evaluation matrix for all proposals shall be made a part of  
12 the procurement file with the Central Purchasing Office. This information shall be kept  
13 confidential until after award of the Contract to the successful firm by the Board or  
14 designee by resolution.

15 (g) Negotiations: Following the interviews, the County shall negotiate with the highest  
16 ranked firm. Negotiations shall be based upon man-hour estimates submitted as part of a  
17 cost proposal following ranking by the Selection Advisory Committee. If agreement on  
18 terms can be reached, a Contract shall be prepared in accordance with provisions adopted  
19 by resolution regarding the County Manager's approval authority set forth in this Article.  
20 If agreement cannot be reached within a reasonable time, the County shall terminate  
21 negotiations with the highest ranked firm, and begin negotiations with the next firm on  
22 the ranking list. This process will continue until a Contract has been negotiated with one  
23 of the firms on the ranking list. If negotiations with the top three firms on the ranking list  
24 have been exhausted and a Contract can still not be negotiated, the County may rank the  
25 other Offerors in their order of qualifications and negotiate with those other qualified  
26 Offerors evaluated by the committee or terminate negotiations.

27 (h) Selection Advisory Committee Membership:

28 (1) The Public Works Division Selection Advisory Committee members shall be as  
29 follows: One position shall be occupied by the Deputy County Manager for Public  
30 Works or designated staff alternate and another position shall be recommended by the  
31 Deputy County Manager for Public Works from public works staff along with an  
32 alternate. The Deputy County Manager for General Services shall recommend two  
33 members along with alternates. One member along with an alternate shall be a  
34 citizen-at-large, not associated with the County or any professional firm.

35 (2) For projects not led the by Public Works Division, other applicable Deputy County  
36 Managers from divisions utilizing the Selection Advisory Committee process shall  
37 assign members and alternates as stated above. The Deputy County Manager for  
38 General Services shall recommend two members along with alternates. One member  
39 along with an alternate shall be a citizen-at-large, not associated with the County or  
40 any professional firm.

41 (3) In case of a project of unique or special nature, the Central Purchasing Office in  
42 conjunction with the User Department may name non-voting subject matter expert(s)  
43 to provide advice to the Selection Advisory Committee during the evaluation process.

1 (4) For projects with funding from other agencies or jurisdictions of at least one third of  
2 the project's total funding, the applicable Deputy County Manager of the division  
3 responsible for the project may name a voting member to the Selection Advisory  
4 Committee for each respective agency(ies).

5 (i) Board of County Commissioners Approval of Contracts: All Contracts for professional  
6 architectural, engineering, land surveying or other Professional Services related to public  
7 works, in an amount exceeding that delegated to the County Manager by resolution shall  
8 require final approval of the Board prior to the award of the Contract.

9 (j) Ownership of Documents: All Contracts between the County and any firm selected under  
10 this division shall contain the provision that all designs, drawings, Specifications, notes,  
11 computer discs and generated work regardless of the media used and other work  
12 developed in the performance of the Contract are the sole property of the County.

13 (k) Multiple-Award Requests for Proposals: Multiple awards of qualification-based selection  
14 of Offerors shall be allowed, unless prohibited by applicable federal law on the date of  
15 award. To utilize multiple Offeror awards, the solicitation must identify the types of  
16 projects for which the RFP is advertised. The specific type of projects shall be identified  
17 by professional discipline and type of work proposed such that qualified firms and  
18 individuals can be identified by the Selection Advisory Committee. Each request for  
19 proposal issued under this section may contain sample tasks on which the Offeror will  
20 base the technical proposal. These sample tasks may be examples of typical work, which  
21 could be awarded under the Contract and not actual projects. The maximum number of  
22 tasks for which a firm may propose may be defined in the RFP. In addition the RFP may  
23 state the maximum number of consultants which will be selected for award in each task.  
24 The written proposals will be scored by the Selection Advisory Committee and  
25 interviews may be held. The Selection Advisory Committee will rank the firms based on  
26 the written proposals and interviews, if applicable, and recommend the selected firms for  
27 award. Once selection is complete and the list of Offerors is approved, pursuant to the  
28 Contract approval requirements of this Article, project assignments shall be made in  
29 accordance with the provisions of the awarded Contract(s).




